



Communication & Media Studies Requirements

All Communication students must take:

- CO 1003 Fundamentals of Public Speaking
- CO 1223 Introduction to Communication Theory
- CO 1403 Introduction to Mass Media
- CO 1503 Introduction to Theatre *See your advisor if another Fine Art was taken before becoming a CO major.

CMST students should take CO 1223 and CO 1403 as early as possible, as they are prerequisites for most upper division classes.

Additionally, the following classes are required for Communication & Media Studies students:

- CO 3223 Comm & Media Research Methods (Prerequisites: CO 1223, CO 1403 and passage of the departmental GSP exam)
- CMST Theory Course
- CMST Theory Course
- CMST Context Course
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- CMST Context Course
- CO Upper Division Elective
- CO Upper Division Elective
- CO 4293 Comm & Media Studies Capstone (Prerequisites: CO 3223 and senior standing)

*CO 4053 Internship Comm can substitute, but must be approved by concentration faculty as capstone equivalent experience.

General Electives:

To graduate, a student must earn 124 hours overall. Most of these hours are met with required Arts & Sciences and Communication courses. However, to reach 124 hours total, Communication & Media Studies students typically must earn 16-19 hours of general elective credit. The first two levels of a foreign language will count as six of these hours. Additional hours may come from Science labs. See your advisor for more information.

Upper Division Hours:

Upper Division classes are labeled at the 3000-4000 level. Communication & Media Studies students are required to take 31 upper division hours in the College of Arts & Sciences to meet graduation requirements.

Arts & Science Requirements

English

- EN 1103 English Comp I
- EN 1113 English Comp II

CO majors must complete EN 1103 English Composition I and EN 1113 English Composition II with a grade of "C" or better.

Students with an ACT English sub-score of 28+ may take Accelerated English Composition II and with a grade of "C" or better earn credit for both English Composition classes.

Foreign Language

- FL_ 1113 Foreign Language I
- FL_ 1123 Foreign Language II
- FL_ 2133 Foreign Language III

Students must complete the third level of a foreign language. The first two levels can count as general electives. Only the third level of a foreign language will satisfy this requirement.

Math

- First math at a lower level

MA 1313 College Algebra or MA 1213 Math in Your World

Students with an 18 or lower on the Math section of the ACT must first take MA 0103 Intermediate Algebra.

- Second math at a higher level

If MA 1313 College Algebra is chosen as the first math, students can choose MA 1323 Trigonometry or MA 2113 Statistics as their second math.

If MA 1213 Math in Your World is chosen as the first math, MA 2113 Statistics must be the second math.

The MSU Math Department requires a C or better in Math in Your World or College Algebra to enroll in a higher-level math.

Students with an ACT Math sub-score of 24+ may take one Math class to satisfy the entire requirement. See your advisor or student handbook for more information.

Science

- Biological Science with lab
- Physical Science
- Physical Science lab *Must correspond with class.
- Third Science *Lab not required.

All science courses must be chosen from the Arts & Sciences core classes as listed on your CAPP report. A list of core Science classes can also be found in your student handbook.

Humanities

- History
- Literature
- Philosophy
- Humanities elective
- Humanities elective
- Humanities elective

The required History and Literature courses must be chosen from the Arts & Sciences core classes as listed on your CAPP report. A list of the core history and literature courses can also be found in your student handbook. The nine hours of Humanities electives must cover at least two areas of study. A list of subjects that count as Humanities can be found in your student handbook and on your CAPP report.

Students may need to take some of their Humanities and/or Social Science electives at the 3000-4000 level to satisfy Arts & Sciences Upper Division requirements. See the handout for your specific concentration area for more information.

Social Sciences

- GR 1123 Intro to World Geography
- PSY 1013 General Psychology
- SO 1003 Intro to Sociology
- Social Science elective
- Social Science elective

Students may only count 6 hours of credit in one subject area toward the Social Science requirements. Additionally, a student can count either EC 2113 Macroeconomics or EC 2123 Microeconomics toward the Social Science requirements but not both. A list of subjects that count as Social Sciences can be found in your student handbook and on your CAPP report.

Note: To graduate, a student must earn 124 hours overall. Most of these hours are met with required Arts & Sciences classes and required Communication classes. Students will need to earn some general elective hours to reach 124 hours total. See your advisor for more information.
